Young Koreans lead protests against the rigged election of April 15 in Korea

Since the spring of 2017, it has been mostly senior citizens who have protested against the impeachment and removal of then President Park and subsequently against President Moon's pro-North Korea and pro-China policies. Most of the protesters who were in their sixties, seventies and eighties have marched, shouted, and waved the Korean and the American flags in vain. Their voice and activities have been systematically ignored by Korean media, and consequently by western media.

The parliamentary election of April 15 this year, however, changed the landscape of the anti-government movement. Fraud and irregularities of the election energize young Koreans in 20's, 30's and 40's and they are taking the lead in what they call "Black Protest"

They don black masks, black clothes and hold black umbrellas. They carry signs which say "Follow the Party", which is alleged to be a digital fingerprint left by Chinese hackers who collaborated with Moon's party for this rigged election. "Follow the Party" is a slogan used by Chinese Communist Party.

Evidences of election fraud and irregularities are mounting. They are gathered, pictured, videotaped, analyzed by various Korean activists, Korean "YouTubers," who use Youtube as broadcast distribution channel, college professors, and civic organizations. They are joined by American researchers such as Professor Walter Mebane Jr. and Dr. Tara O.

Reports of the election fraud and irregularities are spreading outside Korea. The Japanese edition of Newsweek reported on this rigged election on June 1. The Diplomat and The International Business Times carried similar articles on May 22.
